Almost every Sunday morning, I am greeted at the door by **Carol**, who "has something to give me." That "something" is her offering. Always in the form of pennies, with an occasional nickel or dime in the mix, this is what **Carol** has collected or found over the course of the week. Sometimes it only a couple of coins, and sometimes I have to use both hands to hold all of them. Regardless of how much or how many, I know that **Carol** has spent the entire week thinking about what she will have to offer the Lord on Sunday, is joyful in giving it, and always wishes it could be more. **Carol** is a good model for all of us – to everyday be thinking about giving to the Lord, and to look forward to the opportunity to do so.

This Lenten season, we will be receiving an offering which will support UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief). This is the agency in the United Methodist Church which serves as our representatives wherever there is a missional need, or disaster caused by nature or humans all over the world. They are still present in recovery efforts in the aftermath of the tsunami and hurricane Katrina. They are providing clean drinking water, medical care, and other humanitarian aid in many places in Africa where war, AIDS, drought and other factors prevent people from having access to basic necessities.

You are invited to take a "coin bank" available at church and each day drop your change in it. I encourage you to put it somewhere that you will notice it everyday, so you'll remember to fill them. Think about that one thing you pay for or buy every day – the newspaper, your morning coffee (or in my case, Diet Pepsi!), etc. And then consider "matching" that amount, putting the change from the purchase, or even more radical, give up that "one thing" and put the money in your coin bank each day.

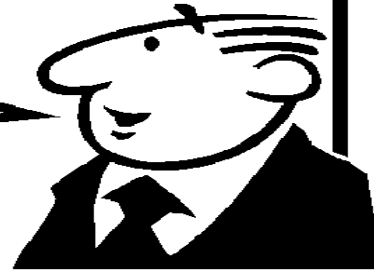
On Palm Sunday, we will present these offerings to God, which will be used to care for God's children, our neighbors in every part of the world.

From Student Pastor Cathy

Sometimes when I'm sitting down to write a sermon or a paper for class based on a scripture passage, I get stuck. I read and re-read the text till I can recite it by memory. I read some outside sources looking for other ways to inform me about this text, and I still get stuck. When this happens, I actually step away from the text.

I look all around me. What is happening in every day life? How is the message of the Gospel brought to life? For example, recently, I was working on a paper and got that "stuck" feeling. After awhile, I got a phone call from home and heard my entire family celebrating my nephew's first birthday. It was very hard for me to hear them say, "we miss you!" Then it got me thinking.

Here was a fairly random group of people getting together to celebrate one link, family. Having a God-moment myself, this is what my paper was about: the promise of God's grace. The text I was working with came to life with that conversation. I was reminded of the support that comes from my family, which comes from God. My family, like God has always been there, ready and willing for whatever was needed. God is always there, ready and willing to help as needed.

In the Gospel of Mark, Jesus teaches about faith in the feeding of the five thousand. Only after a moment away from the crowd does he see that necessity of his presence. Scripture says, "Then, because so many people were coming and going that they did not even have a chance to eat, he said to them, 'Come with me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest.'" Then, the disciples were able to meet the needs of the large crowd. Jesus knew that his disciples were tired. In the same way, God gives us chances to step away from the things that are frustrating; away from the things that make us 'stuck.'

With my example, my quiet place was filled with the sounds of my family. Other times, my quiet place was filled with the words from an old country song or an interesting forward in my e-mail. Where have you found the quiet places? Where or how has God been made known to you? In the lesson from Mark, the disciples used their quiet time to become renewed and refreshed so that they could continue to do the work of God.

I pray that your time of quiet is a time of revelation and renewal.

Bishop C. Joseph Sprague to be Keynoter at Coalition Annual Meeting

The Annual Meeting of the Columbus Coalition for the Homeless will feature United Methodist retired **Bishop C. Joseph Sprague** as the keynote speaker. Bishop Sprague is well known in Central Ohio and across the United Methodist Church for his courageous stands for justice and equality for all people –especially those who are most vulnerable.

The meeting will include the presentation of several awards to people who have given special service to homeless people in Central Ohio, the election of Officers and Board of Directors, and a review of the work of the Coalition.

Bishop Sprague will focus his remarks on actions which citizens can take to move our city and society toward more equitable treatment for everyone, including increased quality affordable housing options, universal health care, universal equitable educational opportunities, living wages for everyone, and an equal voice in the local, state and national elections. He will bring an inspiring and challenging message of hope and responsibility to all who are in attendance.

The Annual Meeting will be held from 9 to 11am on Wednesday April 4 in Huntington Hall at the Downtown YWCA (65 S. 4th St.).

A message from God's Child

We picked up "**Mark**" walking towards the Breakfast at New Life on a cold 15° winter day. He sleeps under a bridge on a pallet with sheet rock sides and a shroud cover. He said he was "blessed" that God had taken care of "all (he) needed". But then he went on. "Do you know what really hurts homeless people?" he said. "I know I am a Child of God. Sometimes the police will come to me to say that another Child of God called, that they don't feel safe walking under the bridge because they see me sleeping there. They are afraid of me and want the police to make me move... But homeless people aren't going to hurt anyone. Don't they know that we are just trying to stay warm and safe, and that this is the only home we have?" And then he looked at us and asked "How can one Child of God do that to another Child of God . . . just because they don't want to look at us? That is like a knife through the heart." A second homeless man nodded in agreement, our hearts sunk. Then he said, "I don't know what God's plan is for my life, I just know God has one. I have to hold on to the fact that on salvation day when we meet God in heaven, and when God shows me all of the things I have done in my life that I am accountable for, I'm only glad that I will never have to say that I did that to another Child of God". As **Mark** left the van, I told him that I thought I understood at least one of the purposes of his life, since I intended to tell his story to as many people as would listen!

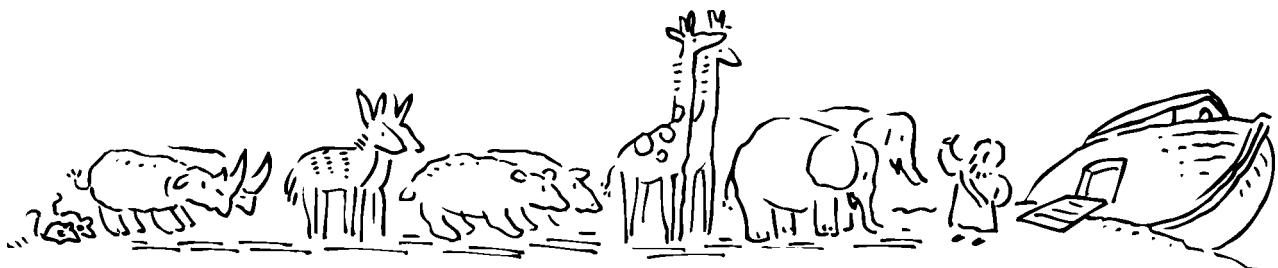

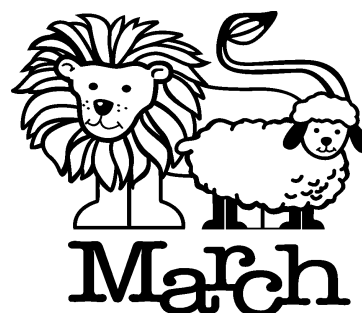
